There exist well functional MIS in college. Almost all the financial management is done digitally; right from the releasing of grant to the utilization of money is through online mode. The salary and expenditure is totally done using Treasury online, Integrated Finance Management System (IFMS), PFMS and GEM. The tax deduction and payment is made online. Admission, enrolment process and internal mark entry of the students is done digitally. Scholarship is also deposited online in the bank account of the student directly.

Though all the financial management is done through MIS (IFMS) still a few components like fee collection is manual for the convenience of the students. The office automation and some of the functioning of the office is fully digital and online as follows.

As a higher education institute of government it is mandatory to go with MIS. AISHE, NIRF, AAA and NAAC are certain procedure and process where acquisition of data is done following MIS. College is participating in all above processes and procedures. This institute is run by Government of Gujarat where e-Governance is implemented through GSWAN and other digital initiatives. Going with Digital India concept, institution has also adopted biometrics based digital presence of the staff.

It is covering all the aspect right from the student information to the academic and administrative criteria. It is also includes almost all aspect like admission, transparency in administration, finance and progression of the student.

#### CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

#### 1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 Mechanism for well Institution has the planned curriculum delivery and documentation.

Bahauddin Science College is an affiliated institute to Saurashtra University. The institute implements the curriculum prescribed by affiliating university. For effective implementation of the curriculum, the wellplanned process is developed and deployed. At the outset, the Principal of the college conducts meetings with the various department heads to develop strategies for effective implementation of the curriculum. Curricula are well distributed amongst the staff members in the beginning of the year. Teachers are encouraged to impart the curriculum through innovative teaching methods such as ICT presentations, assignments, quizzes, discussions, workshops, seminars and industrial visits in addition to that field visit, study tour including the regular/traditional chalk and talk methods are also in practice. All these things are monitored by HODs at the end of every semester and between the terms regularly and there by proper implementation of curricula is ensured. We follow the academic calendar provided by the university which is circulated to all departments. College also prepare a common academic calendar. While departments plan out and prepare their activities and curricula incorporating with academic calendar. At the beginning of the semester we prepare objective driven teaching plan. The College encourages its faculty members to participate in Orientation/ Refresher Courses/ Workshops/ Seminars/ Training Programmes organized by the Universities/ Research Institutes/ Other departments, etc.; to update their knowledge and to improve the teaching practices. The teaching and laboratory plans are approved by Head of Department (HOD) before the commencement of semester and communicated to students by respective course teacher. Over all academic activities and effective execution of time table is monitored by Internal Quality Assurance Committee (IQAC) with help of concerned senior subject teacher and HOD. It also monitors execution of academic calendar and teaching learning process and finds the gap, if any. The academic performance of students is continuously monitored by conducting unit tests during the semester. Ours is a science college where field visits and industrial visits are part of curricular activities. Following are a few activities to mention:

- College was invited and participated in special theme based Nature Education Camp organized by GEER Foundation, Gandhinagar at Aranya Udyan, Gandhinagar (15.09.2014 to 17.09.2014).
- Students were celebrated various days like Wildlife Week, World Ozone Day, etc.
- Students done zoo visit to learn more about animal life, it's conservation and management.
- Students were participated in previous years follow up camp on "Landscape Ecology Training for the Greater Gir Region" organized by GEER Foundation and State Forest Dept. (18.10.2014 & 19.10.2014).
- Chemistry students were also taken to industrial trip as a part of curricula.

Students are encouraged to share their personal/emotional issues which are hindering their curricular growth with their practical incharge. All the teachers are advised to tackle to the student's problems with utmost empathy and confidentiality.

As a measure of reform, we have decided to conduct internal examinations in the same pattern of university examination, i.e., all the examination is conducted on same day with centralize question paper printing, distributing etc. To bring seriousness towards internal examinations amongst students, students are made aware of their internal weightage which carries 30 % marks. Here, we would like to mention because this is a science college, internal examination for the practical is also carried out with utmost care and transparency. Assignment is a part of internal examination given to the students to bring out their own creativity and understanding of the subject. In internal practical, we emphasize on laboratory behaviour, discipline, journal and project submission, attendance and viva-voce as part of internal assessment and evaluation. The results are prepared with the help of answer keys and marking schemes. Results are displayed on notice boards. After internal examination the results are analyzed and steps are taken to identify slow learners and provide coaching in the lacking field of the concerned subject. The slow learners are encouraged to be in touch with concerned subject teacher to enhance their level of understanding.

Academic calendar is prepared well in advance before starting of the academic year. The college's academic calendar reflects the major events incorporated in the affiliating university's academic calendar. The college's academic calendar includes year long planning of tentative dates of internal theory and practical examinations, curricular and co-curricular activities like celebrations of Mahatma Gandhi Jayanti, Sardar Patel Jayanti, Vivekanand Jayanti, Ambedkar Jayanti, Saptdhara activities, camps of NSS, NCC programs and all the government initiatives like Saptdhara, Udhisha, Sandhan, RUSA are included and executed in the calendar as per the guidelines. 4.4.2 Procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.

Our institution's policy is to make all the physical and academic facilities always accessible to our students and also should be in well functioning mode. College is equipped with CCTV camera surveillance system in classroom, laboratories, lobbies, ground and entrance are covered under surveillance. There is central as well as satellite monitoring system of this CCTV network. It is useful

for examination as well as for security purpose for the students, costly instruments. This system is well maintained and updated/upgraded time by time. Our policy is to timely maintain and update these facilities. There is backup system with DVR and a backup of one month is kept. Here it is worth to mention that all the hardware, instruments and softwares are also updated in sophisticate instruments and in all the computers of the college. Furthermost, we are fortunate to have some very old laboratory instruments which are also maintained and kept in working condition. Financial requirements are fulfilled through government grants. As ours is the government college and all the physical entities are maintained through dead stock register which contains purchase, old items, new items, removed entries and newly added items. All the registers of all the years are well maintained with our office.

#### 1- Hostel committee

#### CRITERION VI -GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

#### 6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

Vision

To provide infrastructural facilities and create conducive educational environment to pursue higher education in science stream for the students of this remote and developing area of the state with an aim to bring them in the mainstream development of science, technology, research and value oriented society.

#### Mission

Keeping in the mind the vision and the purpose and thereby provide higher education in science to the students of this area and with these aids bring them into the main stream of the development and thereby develop the society for futuristic overall development process. Also provide higher education which comprehensively includes the traditional and value base system associated with higher education. By this mission provide thrust in the development of the nation and maintain the texture of age old values of our culture and tradition.

#### 6.1.1 Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year

There are two types of decentralization; one is department level and another at committee level decentralization.

#### 1) DEPARTMENTAL LEVEL

College keeps all the departments as one unit in which Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Mathematics, Forensic Science and English are included. Here, each department is having one head of the department where the functioning of HODs is to manage, monitor and mentor whole department including teaching, non-teaching staff and students.

#### 2) COMMITTEE LEVEL

Here, decentralization and distribution of responsibilities and work is done. However, principal by the virtue of the post is an integral part of every committee. Faculty members are given representation in various committees/cells and allowed to conduct various programs to showcase their abilities. They are encouraged to develop leadership skills by being in charge of various academic, co-curricular and extracurricular activities. For effective implementation and improvement of the institute following committees are formed. Other units of the institute like sports, library, store etc. have operational autonomy under the guidance of the various committees/cells.

#### 6.1.2 Does the institution have a Management Information System (MIS)? Yes

There exist well functional MIS in college. Almost all the financial management is done digitally; right from the releasing of grant to the utilization of money is through online mode. The salary and expenditure is totally done using Treasury online, Integrated Finance Management System (IFMS), PFMS and GEM. The tax deduction and payment is made online. Admission, enrolment process and internal mark entry of the students is done digitally. Scholarship is also deposited online in the bank account of the

student directly.

Though all the financial management is done through MIS (IFMS) still a few components like fee collection is manual for the convenience of the students. The office automation and some of the functioning of the office is fully digital and online as follows.

As a higher education institute of government it is mandatory to go with MIS. AISHE, NIRF, AAA and NAAC are certain procedure and process where acquisition of data is done following MIS. College is participating in all above processes and procedures. This institute is run by Government of Gujarat where e-Governance is implemented through GSWAN and other digital initiatives. Going with Digital India concept, institution has also adopted biometrics based digital presence of the staff.

It is covering all the aspect right from the student information to the academic and administrative criteria. It is also includes almost all aspect like admission, transparency in administration, finance and progression of the student.

#### 6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

# 6.2.1 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following (with in 100 words each):

#### Curriculum Development

Our institute is affiliated to Saurashtra University. The institute implements the curriculum prescribed by the affiliating university. Most of our HODs and senior faculties are member of board of studies of the University and they put valuable suggestions on syllabus design. For effective implementation of the curriculum, the well-planned process is developed and deployed by university and institute.

#### Examination and Evaluation

At Bahauddin Science College, Junagadh continuous internal evaluation is a regular process as per CBCS norms. Out of 100 marks of each course, 30 marks are allotted through conducting internal examination and 70 marks for external examination in each semester. The internal examinations are conducted by internal examination committee. The schedule of the internal examination is prepared well by examination committee in advance and communicated to students through notice boards and in class announcements. The schedule of the external examination is prepared by university and make available online on university website and copy of this is displayed on student notice board of the institute.

#### \* Research and Development

In our college good research ambiance is provided. Most of the faculties of our college are doctorate and some are pursuing PhD degree. All have diversified research experience and coming from different background like industries, Analysis laboratories etc, so it helps to student to understand different research problem and aware about research facilities which help to student for their higher education. Beside that our college has various sophisticated instruments like Fourier-transform infrared spectroscopy (FTIR), Gas chromatography (GC), Ultraviolet instrument, bruke-field viscometer, Comparison microscope, Stereo microscope, Spectrophotometer, tensile tester which help to students, for basic operating knowledge of instruments and its application in research. Almost all the faculties have research outcomes. Many papers, few projects, patents and awards are into the account of the college. Some of the faculties have published a number of books. E-journals and E-books are made available for teaching faculty on N-list facility for rapid access to e-resources.

#### ❖ Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

The institute has well furnished library. The library plays major role both in the provision of intimation for study and research. For the better management of library the SOUL (2.0) software in installed. All the class rooms are equipped with LCD projector and teachers using this facility as supporting document to make effective their lectures. This is a science institute and there for it has good instrument facility in each department. The institute is under CCTV surveillance. There are 62 CCTV cameras with backup and DVR is standalone for capturing and storage of images. A separate security system with motion sensor is deployed. Every laboratory is equipped with all class fire extinguishers.

#### Human Resource Management

This is a government college. All the privilege and government beneficiary schemes are applicable to the employees of this college. At the same time all the rule and regulations of a government institution is also observed. As per government norms gazetted officers of the cadre of Class I and Class II have been assigned their duties along with their teaching task. GCSR and certain laws and regulations are to be observed by each employee. The hierarchy from the top Principal Secretary to the Peon comes under the service and regulation act and as a result human resource management is completed perfectly. GPF/CPF and Pension benefits along with medical schemes are applicable as per government norms.

#### Industry Interaction / Collaboration

Chemistry department is in live rapport with various industries. Industrial tour is organized by department of chemistry every year in final semester. Number of extension and outreach programmes conducted in collaboration with industry, community and government organizations like ISRO, PRL and IPR. Our college has also started B.Sc. in Forensic Science since 2009 and it is one of the unique courses offered in this state. The college has also signed MoU with Directorate of Forensic Science (DFS), Govt. of Gujarat branch Regional Forensic Science Laboratory (RFSL). Regular industrial visits, educational tours, field trips and zoo and sanctuary visits are organized by the concerned departments to get the practical exposure about the functioning of the organization.

#### Admission of Students

Admission procedure is online and merit based and admission committee composed of office staff and teaching faculty is taking care of the entire admission procedure. The detail of admission procedure is displayed on notice board as well as on college website. The admission form is filled up online and submitted to college in hard copy with necessary documents. The form is verified and necessary correction is done by the admission committee. The admission process is transparent. The entire admission process is strictly adheres procedures, rules and regulations laid down by the government and affiliating university about reservation policies.

The external auditors verify and certify the entire Income and Expenditure and the Capital Expenditure of the Institute each year. The internal audits are done by office team. They check and verify all the vouchers of the transactions that are carried out in each financial year.

Likewise, an external audit is also carried out time to time by Account General (AG) government of Gujarat audit Department. So far there have been no major findings / objections. Minor errors of omissions and commissions when pointed out by the audit team are immediately corrected / rectified and precautionary steps are taken to avoid recurrence of such errors in future.

The audits of grant under UDISHA, SAPTDHARA, Finishing School and UGC are done by local authorized Chartered Accountant.
