There exist well functional MIS in college. Almost all the financial management is done digitally; right from the releasing of grant to the utilization of money is through online mode. The salary and expenditure is totally done using Treasury online, Integrated Finance Management System (IFMS), PFMS and GEM. The tax deduction and payment is made online. Admission, enrolment process and internal mark entry of the students is done digitally. Scholarship is also deposited online in the bank account of the student directly.

Though all the financial management is done through MIS (IFMS) still a few components like fee collection is manual for the convenience of the students. The office automation and some of the functioning of the office is fully digital and online as follows.

As a higher education institute of government it is mandatory to go with MIS. AISHE, NIRF, AAA and NAAC are certain procedure and process where acquisition of data is done following MIS. College is participating in all above processes and procedures. This institute is run by Government of Gujarat where e-Governance is implemented through GSWAN and other digital initiatives. Going with Digital India concept, institution has also adopted biometrics based digital presence of the staff.

It is covering all the aspect right from the student information to the academic and administrative criteria. It is also includes almost all aspect like admission, transparency in administration, finance and progression of the student.

1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 Mechanism for well Institution has the planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Bahauddin Science College is an affiliated institute. It enforces the curricular prescribed by Saurashtra University. For effective implementation of the curriculum, well-planned process is established and deployed. The principal of the college conducts meeting with the various department heads to develop appropriate strategies for the same.

At the beginning of every academic year, academic calendar of institute is prepared in accordance with academic calendar of Saurashtra University which include internal test schedule, university examination schedule, departmental and institution level activities.

Head of each department allocates the theory and laboratory courses to faculty members according to area of expertise, skills and relevant experience.

The department time table for each semester is prepared which shows theory and laboratory class hours.

Faculty prepares extensive lecture notes using university prescribed books and other references. Laboratory are maintained and upgraded so that students are able to perform experiments in order to understand theoretical concepts with practical applications.

Students' attendance and academic progress for individual course is continuously monitored through teaching plan along with continuous monitoring. Periodical tests are conducted for theory subjects and viva-voce for practical.

1.4.2 How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback on course and curriculum is collected from the students, teachers, parents and alumni manually. The teachers' feedback is analyzed, compiled and proposed for new and relevant advance topics to be included in syllabus in meetings of Board of Studies. The suggestions obtained from feedback cannot be implemented directly at college level. However, the same is shared and discussed with the senior faculty members who are members of board of studies and play a vital role in curriculum designing.

Students' feedback form has been designed to seek feedback from the students regarding the quality of teaching - learning environment and the effective delivery of curriculum. The form includes timely completion of syllabus, punctuality of teachers, teaching – learning environment in class, student-teacher interactions, use of ICT tools and availability of teachers after lecture hours etc.

Parents feedback form is designed to collect information relating to their satisfaction towards curriculum which covers various aspects like the level of curriculum/syllabus in different semesters, accessibility of textbooks, quality and relevance of curriculum, job placements, quality of teaching etc. are included.

We have English subject as Foundation Course which provides an opportunity to be in touch with all the students for the moral teaching and over all development of the students. Students are encouraged to share their personal/emotional issues which are hindering their curricular growth with their practical in-charge. All the teachers are advised to tackle to the student's problems with utmost empathy and care.

Execution and reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation is carried out as per the guidelines of affiliating university. Internal examination carries 30 % of marks which includes internal tests, timely submission of assignments, laboratory behaviour and journal and project submission etc. We conduct internal examinations in the same pattern of university examination, i.e., all the examinations are conducted on same day with centralize question paper printing and distributing etc. Here, we would like to mention because this is a science college, internal examination for the practical is also carried out with utmost care and transparency. Assignment is a part of internal examination given to the students to bring out their own creativity and understanding of the subject. In internal practical, we emphasize on laboratory behaviour, discipline, journal and project submission, attendance and viva-voce as part of internal assessment and evaluation. The results are prepared with the help of answer keys and marking schemes. Results are displayed on notice boards. After internal examination the results are analyzed and steps are taken to identify slow learners and provide coaching in the lacking field of the concerned subject. The slow learners are encouraged to be in touch with concerned subject teacher to enhance their level of understanding.

For smooth functioning of the commencing academic year, the academic calendar is formed. The college's academic calendar reflects the major events incorporated in the affiliating university's academic calendar. 4.4.2 Procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.

Our institution's policy is to make all the physical and academic facilities always accessible to our students and also should be in well functioning mode. At the beginning of each academic year, the institute tries to implement this policy by providing all the requisite details to students through orientation programme on how to utilize our library, classrooms, laboratories, DELL Lab, play ground and assembly hall. Besides that, our institution keeps updating every year all the physical and academic facilities as and when needed. As this college is a science college having variety of science subjects like chemistry, physics, botany, zoology, mathematics and forensic science, standard laboratory procedure and protocol is observed. All student related notices including results are regularly put on the website. We also maintain facilities like Public Address System, Intercom, Internet, LAN, burglar alarm (security system). College is equipped with CCTV camera surveillance system in classroom, laboratories, lobbies, ground and entrance are covered under surveillance. There is central as well as satellite monitoring system of this CCTV network. It is useful for examination as well as for security purpose for the students, costly instruments. This system is well

maintained and updated/upgraded time by time. Our policy is to timely maintain and update these facilities. There is backup system with DVR and a backup of one month is kept. Here it is worth to mention that all the hardware, instruments and softwares are also updated in sophisticate instruments and in all the computers of the college. Furthermost, we are fortunate to have some very old laboratory instruments which are also maintained and kept in working condition. Financial requirements are fulfilled through government grants. As ours is the government college and all the physical entities are maintained through dead stock register which contains purchase, old items, new items, removed entries and newly added items. All the registers of all the years are well maintained with our office.

committees are formed. Other units of the institute like sports, library, store etc. have operational autonomy under the guidance of the various committees/cells.

6.1.2 Does the institution have a Management Information System (MIS)? Yes

There exist well functional MIS in college. Almost all the financial management is done digitally; right from the releasing of grant to the utilization of money is through online mode. The salary and expenditure is totally done using Treasury online, Integrated Finance Management System (IFMS), PFMS and GEM. The tax deduction and payment is made online. Admission, enrolment process and internal mark entry of the students is done digitally. Scholarship is also deposited online in the bank account of the student directly.

Though all the financial management is done through MIS (IFMS) still a few components like fee collection is manual for the convenience of the students. The office automation and some of the functioning of the office is fully digital and online as follows.

As a higher education institute of government it is mandatory to go with MIS. AISHE, NIRF, AAA and NAAC are certain procedure and process where acquisition of data is done following MIS. College is participating in all above processes and procedures. This institute is run by Government of Gujarat where e-Governance is implemented through GSWAN and other digital initiatives. Going with Digital India concept, institution has also adopted biometrics based digital presence of the staff.

It is covering all the aspect right from the student information to the academic and administrative criteria. It is also includes almost all aspect like admission, transparency in administration, finance and progression of the student.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following (with in 100 words each):

Curriculum Development

Our institute is affiliated to Saurashtra University and Bhakt Kavi Narsinh Mehta University. The institute implements the curriculum prescribed by the affiliating university. Most of our HODs and senior faculties are member of board of studies of the University and they put valuable suggestions on syllabus design. For effective implementation of the curriculum, the well-planned process is developed and deployed by university and institute.

***** Examination and Evaluation

At Bahauddin Science College, Junagadh continuous internal evaluation is a regular process as per CBCS norms. Out of 100 marks of each course, 30 marks are allotted through conducting internal examination and 70 marks for external examination in each semester. The internal examinations are conducted by internal examination committee. The schedule of the internal examination is prepared well by examination committee in advance and communicated to students through notice boards and in class announcements. The schedule of the external examination is prepared by university and make available

online on university website and copy of this is displayed on student notice board of the institute.

* Research and Development

In our college good research ambiance is provided. Most of the faculties of our college are doctorate and some are pursuing PhD degree. All have diversified research experience and coming from different background like industries, Analysis laboratories etc, so it helps to student to understand different research problem and aware about research facilities which help to student for their higher education. Beside that our college has various sophisticated instruments like Fourier-transform infrared spectroscopy (FTIR), Gas chromatography (GC), Ultraviolet instrument, bruke-field viscometer, Comparison microscope, Stereo microscope, Spectrophotometer, tensile tester which help to students, for basic operating knowledge of instruments and its application in research. Almost all the faculties have research outcomes. Many papers, few projects, patents and awards are into the account of the college. Some of the faculties have published a number of books. E-journals and E-books are made available for teaching faculty on N-list facility for rapid access to e-resources.

❖ Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

The institute has well furnished library. The library plays major role both in the provision of intimation for study and research. For the better management of library the SOUL (2.0) software in installed. All the class rooms are equipped with LCD projector and teachers using this facility as supporting document to make effective their lectures. This is a science institute and there for it has good instrument facility in each department. The institute is under CCTV surveillance. There are 62 CCTV cameras with backup and DVR is standalone for capturing and storage of images. A separate security system with motion sensor is deployed. Every laboratory is equipped with all class fire extinguishers.

❖ Human Resource Management

This is a government college. All the privilege and government beneficiary schemes are applicable to the employees of this college. At the same time all the rule and regulations of a government institution is also observed. As per government norms gazetted officers of the cadre of Class I and Class II have been assigned their duties along with their teaching task. GCSR and certain laws and regulations are to be observed by each employee. The hierarchy from the top Principal Secretary to the Peon comes under the service and regulation act and as a result human resource management is completed perfectly. GPF/CPF and Pension benefits along with medical schemes are applicable as per government norms.

Industry Interaction / Collaboration

Chemistry department is in live rapport with various industries. Industrial tour is organized by department of chemistry every year in final semester. Number of extension and outreach programmes conducted in collaboration with industry, community and government organizations like ISRO, PRL and IPR. Our college has also started B.Sc. in Forensic Science since 2009 and it is one of the unique courses offered in this state. The college has also signed MoU with Directorate of Forensic Science (DFS), Govt. of Gujarat branch Regional Forensic Science Laboratory (RFSL). Regular industrial visits, educational tours, field trips and zoo and sanctuary visits are organized by the concerned departments to get the practical exposure about the functioning of the organization.

❖ Admission of Students

Admission procedure is online and merit based and admission committee composed of office staff and teaching faculty is taking care of the entire admission procedure. The detail of admission procedure is displayed on notice board as well as on college website. The admission form is filled up online and submitted to college in hard copy with necessary documents. The form is verified and necessary

correction is done by the admission committee. The admission process is transparent. The entire admission process is strictly adheres procedures, rules and regulations laid down by the government and affiliating university about reservation policies.
